Interim Pastor's Annual Report



During this second week in Epiphany, I've been praying with a text that will be shared in service on January 15. It's not the theology, John's Christology or the notion of salvation that has captured my attention since my spiritual formation training back in 1999-

2001. I was asked to pray with John 1:29 -42 for a month.

In this first chapter of John, Jesus is identified as the Lamb of God. John tells us he witnessed the spirit like a dove making itself at home in Jesus at his baptism. As Jesus passes by John and his disciples, John points out that Jesus is to be God's Passover lamb. Jesus questions John's two disciples with the words, "what are you after?"

It has always amazed me that they answer with curiosity about where Jesus is staying. Jesus simply replies with the invitation, "come and see for yourself". There are no religious, spiritual or philosophical questions, but one born out of human curiosity. The text goes on to tell us they follow Jesus to where he is staying and spends the day with him. In my tenure with you Parkrose, I have come to appreciate our being curious together as a spiritual practice of great importance in our ever-changing world today.

On Bread Street's website I recently read:

Somewhere along the line, curiosity got a bad reputation. Curiosity killed the cat. Curiosity led Pandora to open a box full of misery. But, I think this is a good time to embrace curiosity. Curiosity, I would argue is an excellent antidote to uncertainty and fear. Celeste Ng is a novelist who wrote *Little Fires* Everywhere and Everything I Never Told You. Her family motto is, "Be kind, be curious, be helpful." Her son can't figure out why curious is in the mix. She told him: "Because being curious is admitting that you don't know, but also that you want to know. . . . that people you don't know are worth knowing, that they have something to teach you. That learning about them, that encountering new ideas doesn't threaten you, it enriches you. . . . That you approach the world as a trove of things to take in, rather than things you frantically, fearfully wall out. I am a big fan of curiosity. Curiosity keeps us open and wondering and less likely to judge and/or shut down. I believe that right now, God is calling us to be curious".



In last year's report, I made the statement: Parkrose is pregnant with purpose.

We had so much to be curious about. With the pandemic still nipping at our toes, we resumed in-person services, and, thanks to our wonderful tech team, our service continues to be livestreamed. The team is ever curious about how best to offer a quality experience no matter how it's attended. We remain curious about our livestream community, and how to develop relationships with them.

Leadership and I got very curious about the meaning of membership for church today - which lead us to amending our constitution and bylaws. We've also been curious about best relationship/communication practices between the pastor and congregation and are fashioning a proposal for a PPR team. Aaron, leadership and I are curious about how to develop a strong and comprehensive social media presence.

Parkrose, in relationship with WeShine, Feed the Mass, Sovalti, Portland Tree Project, Cultivate Initiative, Union Gospel Mission and the evolving microvillage on our campus have led us to wonder about one another, and guide how we live together.

Clay helped us be curious about plant-based eating and hosted a Climate Café luncheon. I'm eager to be working with Clay as our new moderator, and am ever grateful for the 2022 co-moderators.

I continue to be curious in conversation during Sunday service with the many voices that are valuable facets of the congregation and community.

The transition team finished her work, and the newly formed search committee became curious as how to best reframe the church profile questions. In offering narratives, we have found that what we have become in the last three years is being expressed and will offer good dialogue to be had with pastoral candidates.

I know that when it's my time to leave, I will remain curious about Parkrose's development that has been a blessing to me and the community.

What I shared in my January Crier article is worth repeating:

Every year, once Jesus is born, our attention turns away from Mary to her newborn son. Dr. Christine Hong, in her reflection on Luke 2:1-20, wisely challenges us with the following questions as we celebrate this virgin birth: Can we keep our eyes on Mary too? Can we offer her some nourishment? Can we offer her some postpartum care and rest? Dr. Hong shares that in the Korean culture, a nourishing soup is given to a woman after childbirth to restore her body, and to increase her healing after laboring to bring a child into this world.





I sense, in a metaphorical way, that you, Parkrose, this past year, have birthed a new ministry - and a new way to be church. You, metaphorically, have been Mary that has given birth to so much new life. My heart is filled with gratitude for your vulnerability and courage in saying "yes". So, I pray that you, Parkrose, will find rest, nourishment, compassion, and care as you heal from labor and childbirth. I pray that you take the time to understand your central role, and embrace both the excruciating pain, and ecstatic joy, of bringing new life into our world. And most of all, I pray you stay curious.

Report from the Moderators

We continued to hold in-person services in 2022 as well as live stream. We have many folks live stream that cannot make it to service, or who live out of the area. Some join us from out the country, too. Many thanks to staff and tech crew for making this possible. Our two annual meetings were held via Zoom.

It was a busy year. We continued our partnerships with Feed the Mass, SoValTi, Darkness to Light, Portland Fruit Tree Project, WeShine, SnowCap, and Union Gospel Mission. We created new partnerships with Cultivate Initiatives and Outside In.

Our partnership with Feed the Mass, a non-profit cooking school that prepares fresh, healthy meals to be distributed in the community continued during 2022. Thanks to the dedicated group of volunteers who pick up meals and distribute them at church, we were able to pass out up to 45 meals each week on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. To round out the healthy meals, Parkrose adds fruit, cookies, and water.

Our partnership with SoValTi continued. They continue their online classes and are doing some in person as well to offer and assist individuals with resources and tools to lead healthy and productive lifestyles.

Darkness to Light continues to meet on Friday evening, and Saturday and Sunday afternoons. They are thankful they have a place to worship, and we are pleased to have them here at our church. They prepared a wonderful tamale lunch for us in December, and since our lunch, we've had an opportunity to purchase Mrs. Leyva's wonderful chicken and cheese tamales.

Our partnership with the Portland Fruit Tree Project continues to work well. They held several work parties and maintained the orchard through the Fall. The heat over the summer damaged some fruit, but a lot of pruning took place. They also received a grant to upgrade the watering system in the orchard.



Our partnership with WeShine (Welcoming, Empowering, Safe Habitation Initiative with Neighborhood Engagement) evolved. Prior to construction of the micro village, we did experience difficulty removing one of our tenters, and it involved taking legal action. This also resulted in considerable damage to our property. It took a restraining order and police action to keep him off the property. Surveillance cameras were installed, and repairs were done by the Trustees with the help of generous donations. Building

of the micro village began in the summer, and ten pods were completed. The pods are in a fenced area, and the village will have a community building for cooking, meetings, and activities in 2023. A coordinator resides on the property, and WeShine does the intake process for guests and manages the micro village. It is working out well, and we have a lot of community support. WeShine uses some of the rooms in the church for meetings and business until the community building is constructed.

We continue our partnership with Union Gospel Mission for Monday evening showers. In addition to a shower, meals from Feed the Mass are available for those that want one.

A new partnership is Cultivate
Initiatives. They are an east Portland
nonprofit agency that provides services
and support to those who have been
marginalized and underserved.
They come to Parkrose on Wednesday to
provide showers, laundry services and
have clothing available for those in need
in the community.

Another new partnership between WeShine and Parkrose UCC is with Outside In. They are a nonprofit agency providing integrated medical services in the community in their Mobile Medical Van twice a month on the Parkrose campus. This service is open to the community.

Many people from Parkrose volunteer at SnowCap. This nonprofit agency that provides food and clothing for those in need in East County is near and dear to our hearts. Parkrose was one of the



founding churches of SnowCap back in the 1960s. In addition to volunteering, we collect and donate food, clothing, and school supplies.

Two Red Cross blood drives were also held at Parkrose in 2022 under the leadership of Erica and volunteers.

The search team is hard at work developing our church profile and begin the process of seeking a Settled Pastor for Parkrose.

A change in leadership will begin in 2023 as Clay Osburn was elected Moderator. We are grateful for the opportunity to serve Parkrose this past year. Thanks to our dedicated staff, officers, ministry teams, volunteers, and partners for all we accomplished in 2022. Together we have made a difference, and we look forward to new opportunities to serve the community in 2023.

Our Service to the Community

- Turtle monitoring project in the Columbia Slough and Multnomah Channel Our youth have volunteered with City of Portland Ecologist Laura Guderyahn in monitoring several natural area sites for the presence of Oregon's native turtles. This has been a wonderful way to demonstrate our commitment to caring for creation. This project will remain a focus of service in 2023.
- **12 Basking platforms** were built with PCUCC & youth Interns from City Ecology.
- Our Youth assisted in the collection of canned goods for Souper Bowl of

- Caring. Our drive yielded 93 lbs. of food & clothing and \$70.00 in donations for SnowCap Charities.
- Sierra Service Project- 6 Youth & Friends traveled 327.3 miles to Del Norte Co. California. Over 200 volunteer hours were served building an ADA ramp for a multi-generational family. Over 30 hours were spent pulling invasive European Beach Grass. Add in the many hours supping together, enjoying friendship, laughter, and spiritual connection.
- Installation & Dedication of Youth Mural & Courtyard Meadowscape
- 1 amazing, beautifully painted youth mural was installed and over 35 salmon painted and placed on fences around the PCUCC campus.

As the fall-out from living through a pandemic has demonstrated, the church has continued the good works to innovate and redesign how we connect as a church and serve our community's ever-changing needs.

Entering a partnership with WeShine

The impact and benefits of the WeShine micro village to the Parkrose UCC community are ever abundant. Our partnership with WeShine is providing a welcoming, empowering, safe transitional village for 8-10 individuals at a time. One individual has moved onto permanent housing!

The relationships created, and the essential services and programs offered by these groups will only enhance ministry that already happens here at Parkrose Community UCC, in addition to joining us in new ways, to a build greater network of social good.

Below are amazing outcomes that transpired during 2022:

- Provided essential services with Partners, Such as Union Gospel Mission, Cultivate Initiatives and Outside In.
- Construction of the pods in the WeShine Village and welcomed

- WeShine staff and villagers into our community.
- Weekly Shower services with **UGM** and **Cultivate Initiatives** for villagers and to the unsheltered neighbors. This partnership provided showers, clothing & life care essentials to **104** persons in the community.
- Resumed the Internship program with Rosemary Anderson High school, until June 2022/ graduation.

Crafter's Bazaar & Fall Festival

Our Crafter's Bazaar & Fall Festival held on October 1st, was a magnificent day! We had participation with fantastic vendors, amazing community partners and a community favorite-adorable BABY GOATS!

2022 Investment Team Report

The Investment Team was established on February 14, 2010 by the Church Council. Investments with Scheller Financial Services and United Church Funds are currently being overseen by Blair Loudat. An Investment Policy was also created in 2010 by the original Investment Team and approved by the Church Council as a guide for investing. The Policy Statement reads:

"The stewardship responsibilities associated with the investment of Parkrose Community United Church of Christ investment funds are to be discharged in such a manner as to maximize the return on investments while also considering such factors as the preservation and safety of capital and prudent diversification of funds that are socially responsible."

The Church currently has three investment accounts – one with Scheller Financial Services and two with United Church Funds.

Wygant Property Funds

The funds from the sale of the Wygant property are invested with Scheller Financial Services. The account began the year with a balance of \$238,029 and ended with \$177,303. Accounting for \$30,000 in withdrawals for operating cost, the loss for the year is actually **\$30,726**.

Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund is with the United Church Funds, which is associated with the United Church of Christ.



Investments in the United Church Fund are in the stock market. The interest accrued each quarter is sent to the church and becomes income in our budget. For 2022, the interest income was \$2051. No sale of assets will be made without congregational approval. As of December 31, 2021, the fund had a book value of \$87,658 and a market value of \$176,236. As of December 31, 2022, the market value had declined to \$143,827 for an overall loss of **\$32,409**.

Our Special Outreach Fund began the year with a book value for this investment of \$416,709 and the market value of \$482,770. The year ended with a book value of \$313,054 and a market value of \$319,078. It is important to note that over the course of the year, \$70,000 has been withdrawn for operating expenses. The overall loss for this account including withdrawals is \$163,692.





Our goals for 2022 were:

- 1. To assist Pastor Dianne in the planning and set up of worship.

Trustees Ministry Team

- Jesse Goodling and Tub Harden installed a replacement door at the west office entrance to increase security. The new door is stronger than the previous door, with an improved latching system.
- Held a church grounds work day on March 26. We did tree and shrub pruning, weeding, and grass mowing.
- Held a second church grounds work day on May 21 to prune shrubs, do weed trimming, and haul off the piles of fruit tree pruning material and other yard waste.
- Mowed the church grass and trimmed weeds during the 2022 growing season.
- Assisted with the construction of WeShine small houses, beginning in June 2022. This work continued on multiple weekends.
- Replaced the three broken windows in the Narthex with laminated glass
- Replaced the three broken sliding glass doors in the front offices with window and wall combinations.
- Tub Harden installed a dead bolt lock on the exit door next to the large kitchen to improve security.
- Installed plexiglass to cover the broken stained-glass panes in the rear and front walls of the sanctuary
- Installed the Wyze security cameras, solar panels, and base station.



- Helped WeShine install tie-down devices for the small houses. These provide stability for the houses during high wind events.
- Replaced 10 burned out fluorescent light tubes in the sanctuary outside wall roof overhang
- Tub Harden and Jesse Goodling bolted wood sheets to the chain link fence near Bi-Mart to protect it from further damage after someone had cut a hole in the fence.
