The last two months have flown by and I have deeply enjoyed our time together. I've said it before, and I will say it again: this is a special community. It is always easy to look around and see the work that needs to be done. The needs that are going unmet. The holes in our planning and projects that need to be filled. The stuff on the "to do" list that has yet to be attended to. I usually find this focus disheartening rather than motivational. We must, of course, be aware of such things, but I also think we must have balance in our perspective. What has gone well? What has been done? What needs have been met? What holes have been filled?

So far, we have completed one preaching series. I called it "Harvest Season" because we were harvesting Feedback From, our congregation to construct next steps for the greatest concerns you have expressed. I deeply value collaboration, and you all really came through. So far you are seeing the results of her harvesting been implemented where possible. Our worship services continue to be refined. More relational spaces are being created. Opportunities for communal healing, support, and inclusion are being explored. We are in ongoing discerning conversations with potential community partners. Not to mention all of the wonderful work, relationships, and plans you were already busy with before I arrived!

Community Life News WeShine! Volunteers are needed for Winter meals!

As it becomes colder, the villagers spend more time inside their pods staying warm and cozy. Around this time of year our weekly village meals become all the more important for connection and bringing villagers together.



I'm reaching out to you because providing meals is our most vital volunteer need! Providing a meal to the villagers makes a huge difference in their week. In the past, you have shown

interest in providing a meal for WeShineso we are reaching out to you for the upcoming Fall and Winter seasons.

We use **SignUp Genius** for meal signups, please sign up here!

For those who are able, we ask that you sign up for one week a month. But we also welcome those who sign up outside of a monthly commitment! If you have not already done so, please obtain your Oregon Food Handler's Card and send me a copy. The test is based on villages provided within the training and the card will remain valid for two years. The training costs \$10, will take about half an hour to complete, and is entirely online.

If you plan to attend the Chef and Villager Community Meal in January, we ask that you submit a background check. Please contact us and then we will send you a consent form and background check link.
