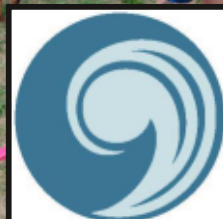

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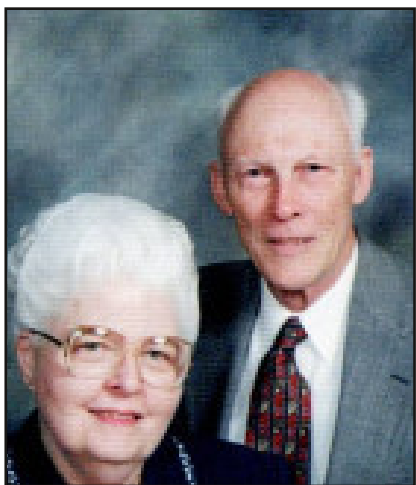

Pastor's Annual Report

Dear Parkrose Community United Church of Christ,

Our country has been gripped by an icy storm for over a year. Instead of clearing up, it's been getting worse. The damage to many families and lives is irreversible. So many times, I have sought God's wisdom in dealing with this moment. I have asked them, how long will this last? Is this the way it's going to be from now on? How do we survive a storm like this? Will we, our neighbors, our city, our country make it through?



I have no trite words of comfort to share, and no easy answers. What I do have, however, is strong conviction in how we move forward—and that looks a lot like what we did over the last year. We keep pursuing “the next right thing,” as the great poet once said. We keep living into our mission and vision.

Our mission is to love God, one another, and our neighbors as ourselves. Our vision for accomplishing this work is by compassionately serving the wider community, courageously practicing peace and justice, enthusiastically inviting and welcoming everyone, and faithfully worshipping as community to deepen our spirituality.

We care about our community—we are our community. We serve those in need, alongside those in need, often as those in need ourselves. We continue to offer sack lunches on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays—thank you Lucille and the rest of the sack lunch team! We continue to partner with Cultivate Initiatives, our local nurse training programs, Care Oregon, and others each and every week for Wellness Wednesdays. Erica, you will always have my gratitude for making these happen—as will the rest of your team who provide a welcoming space while also attending to the difficult demands of use and misuse.

We have also become a bit of a hub for like-minded community organizations. We continue to walk alongside our longstanding campus partners: WeShine, SoValTi, Portland Fruit Tree Project, Portland Parks and Recreation (through our Eastminster Community Garden), and Iglesia del Dios Viviente. We've also gained new regulars in the building over the last year: Juntos NW and Portland Contra Las Deportaciones. Additionally, Kalikasan Solidarity Organization and Together Lab have utilized space as well. Each one of these organizations has made a tremendous impact. By working with them, we contribute to the well-being of hundreds of people—most of whom we'll never meet. People get to eat through these programs. They cultivate life-management skills and gain long-term, stable housing through them. They worship—and gather as community of similar background. They pursue and maintain sobriety. They advocate for justice, peace, and survival. I am so grateful for these relationships. Most (though



not all) also provide us with funding necessary for keeping this building and church going. Our two most substantial campus partners, WeShine and SoValTi, even voluntarily increased their monetary commitments. Simply incredible.

Speaking of partners, we've also continued to support SnowCap. Some of you are there weekly as volunteers and daily as staff. Some also provide substantial financial support. We've also

continued to foster a relationship with Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon. Next month, I will be interviewing the head of one of their programs, Second Home.

We've also continued to grow in our relationship with Together Lab. This last year, we (again, with Erica's leadership) became founding members of the East Portland Youth Collective. It has been a commitment of hope for tomorrow, but requiring money, time, and energy today. As such, we now have a youth organizer, Cris Saldivar. Expect much in the way of program development and events this year.

Speaking of Together Lab brings to mind the countless ways we have organized—especially for and with our immigrant neighbors. What started off as a compliment to our efforts with Asylum-Seeker Solidarity Collective evolved into work to promote safety and support for immigrants as a whole. Our Restorative Justice Team has folks who have worked with so many organizations now, in addition to Together Lab: schools, ECMA, PIRC, Leaven, EMO, Kalikasan, Bayan, IMIrJ, Indivisible, Portland Contra Las Deportaciones—and so many others that I can't recall at this time.

I have been proud to have our church's backing in a number of fronts that intersect with those mentioned above. Here are some of the efforts I represented our church in: leading a team in Salem that met with our state lawmakers re: tentative legislation; accompanying families twice-a-month at immigration court; protesting and supporting protestors at the ICE building; and advocating at city and county meetings.

I also represented our church at the Central Pacific Conference in September, when I had the opportunity to present on the work that we do. And I represent our church as well as our conference at the triannual General Synod of the United Church of Christ in July. There, I helped shape a measure re: human rights for religious minorities in India; testified for human rights in the Philippines; and supported measures such as bolstering support for immigrants, OWL education, and the ending of genocide in Palestine.

All of this took place amidst a backdrop of community love. I deeply value the connections we make—I think of my role as pastor as intentionally fostering healthy connection to God, one another, our neighbors, within ourselves, and the world. Our congregation kept showing up to cultivate these connections—and to invite others into enjoying them as well. Weekly events, such as worship, fellowship time, Connect

Groups, and Wellness Wednesdays. As well as special events such as potlucks, special services, the Crafter Bazaar, bake sales, and the auction. We keep nurturing our relationships with one another, and making room for others who join us. As a result, we grew in our weekly attendance, and our Connect Groups have now maxed out our meeting spaces.

Our worship services are geared with cultivating connections in mind as well—indeed, this is just another way to view “the greatest commandment,” of which our worship is consistently seeking to reinforce. Niki and I work hard to create a coherent service every week, and are lucky to have such great help in doing so—our work would be vastly more difficult with the Tech Team, Guitar Friends, and Parish Life. We spent most of the year in the books of Luke and Acts. Through my own wrestlings with the text, I often found myself edified and challenged to keep pushing in the work we do in the Spirit of love. I received feedback from others that they, likewise, found such encouragement. As I go through John this year, and whatever else I preach on after it, I hope we will all be heartened as well. Our guests for interviews and for preaching likewise amplified our connections—I am so grateful for our growing network of incredible people we get to learn from!



The work we do matters. The love you live into matters. This time last year, I was asked what we can do about the mess befalling us. I responded that we keep showing up and doing what we can in our neighborhood. I think that is still true today. We feel



powerless to make change when we focus on the national level. The state and city levels are overwhelming enough. But we make a difference each and every week in innumerable ways right here. That will be true this year as well—not just as an institution, but for each one of us in our own web of relationships. Through these smaller networks, we support one another. Through these supports, we form larger networks that result in city, county, state, and even national change. Love is making a difference right now, and will win in the end.

Because of everyone's efforts, our community and youth programs have continued without pause. We truly appreciate your support.

Youth, Sunday School & Fellowship:

Although Sunday school draws in visitors and attendance can ebb and flow, we remain devoted to nurturing relationships, ensuring every child feels safe to be themselves, and providing steady support. In this welcoming space, young people build meaningful bonds, discover a true sense of belonging, and grow in their faith together.

We have a very small, hearty, and dedicated core group that attends each Sunday. Alas, I could not go further without saying that we could not have had such an excellent program design without the invaluable assistance of Tanya Putman, Stephanie Amato, Vickie Lyman, and Lea Saito. Here are creative ways we built community in 2025:

Our “out of door” activities continue to be a hit, with body prayer being a class favorite, as well as playing games like cut-throat Harry Potter UNO and I-Spy Dancing Jesus.

We adopted a neighborhood kitty and named him “Pants”. I might also add that this inspired a rename of the Sunday Morning group- front runner group name *“Fellowship of the Pants”*.

We also busied ourselves in random craft activities with beads and too much glitter, reenacted “Hamilton”, picked berries, looked for worms, wondered, painted each other’s



faces, made care kits for Wellness Wednesday, bagged **24 bags** of cat & dog food and hygiene kits for low income and unhoused neighbors, and purchased goods for our favorite food pantry-SnowCap Charities.

All of these activities have helped us build relationships while putting into action messages of care for one another, our faith, and justice.

Fellowship & Fun

This group of youth, along with their families and friends, enjoy spending time together and having fun. Additionally, we aim to organize events that bring people of all ages together, foster friendships and connections within our church community.

This past year, the Youth & Families Group engaged in the following activities:

We, The Youth, Friends and volunteers:

- Hosted the **Easter Breakfast Fundraiser**. We raised over \$380.00 for programming for Youth (& Families) for future activities and service projects. Thank you to all who helped prepare food and, of course, those who came, “strapped on the feedbag” and ate breakfast. (Todd’s Lamb Cake was an absolute hit!)
- Hosted **2 coffee hours**; one where we honored the “Dads, Grads & Rads” in our lives. We had 3 senior youth that “leveled up” this past year and moved on to stretch their big, beautiful, expansive wings, whether it’s off to college, or a gap year or working and exploring life. Gamers call this Leveling up!
- Enjoyed an entire **Youth Group dinner gathering** at Bollywood Theater, Last Spring.
- We Painted **One Mural** with Portland Fruit Tree Project, AmeriCorps, Darkness to Light congregation & WeShine Villagers. We look forward to blessing this mural in March 2026.
- Enjoyed at least **2 picnics** and we personally consumed 5 pounds of frozen yogurt with Youth folk.
- Over **20 hours of driving practice** for one special Youth member!
- Took 2 youth to a **Stilt Walking Workshop**. Watching trepidation transition into strength was inspiring. 😊



The Crafter's Bazaar & Fall Fest was another smashing good time! We enjoyed Raffle winners, Slushies, Tamales, Baby Goats, Community Corner & Vendors selling their wares. What a fabulous time! Here are some quick stats of the day.

- We had 15 vendors & community partners! Several of which were first time attendees.
- **Portland Fruit Tree Project** brought their apple press and made terrific cider, as well as delicious, canned goods! Our baby goats are always a hit!
- We raised nearly **\$1500.00** and built TONS of community that day!

- **Raising funds with HeMan & Skeletor!** Thank you for your support for Our Costume Contest Fundraiser! It was a fun way to raise funds. We raised over **\$358.00** for Wellness Wednesday supplies and needs! We look forward to doing this again in 2026!
- The season of Advent brought us finally, a very **"Solstice Sunday"** Program which was indeed a favorite activity. This year we looked for **"Divine in the Darkness"**. We wove the stories the stories from Nordic, Ukrainian and Indigenous traditions to inspire seeking "light" in the darkness.



Our Youth Collective Program

One of the things I am very proud to be a part of with Pastor Giuseppe and along with fellow organizers from East County Ministerial Alliance, Together Lab, Youth Solidarity formed the **East County Youth Collective**. We held our meeting on May 8th and have identified the 4 anchor Congregations: Parkrose Community UCC, Gethsemane Lutheran, Covenant Presbyterian and Trinity Lutheran in Gresham.

(Many of these churches host other congregations and will likely join in at some point. As was shared before, the



financial commitment for funding the Youth Collective, Parkrose UCC is \$5000.00 along with the other anchor churches, with the exception of Trinity Lutheran whose youth has the most attendees.) It took time to go over the partnership and financial agreements, building the job description and the hiring of **Cris Saldivar**.

Vi, Lea and I attended the first open house gathering in early January. We look forward to growing momentum for this Youth Collective Collaboration. There is still a need for me to stay on in advisory and support roles at this time.

Community Life Leadership Role & Community Giving

A continuation of nurturing our partnership with our church campus, surrounding community and WeShine. The church has an endless desire to redesign how we connect as a church and serve our community's ever-changing needs. This energy is contagious! Essential services and outreach were provided to our low income and unhoused neighbors in partnership with organizations like **Cultivate Initiatives, Hairstylists for Humanity, Community Cycling Center, PBOT-Portland Bureau of Transportation, American Red Cross, Care Oregon, WeShine PDX and Russell Neighborhood Association.**

In 2025, we were successful in building up our programs (such as Wellness Wednesday) and strengthening our relationships with the community. Our ministry continues to provide opportunities for faith into action and fellowship, helping us to build a stronger network for promoting social good.

We collected over **40+ bags of much needed clothing/shoes** that we shared with the WeShine Clothing Closet, Cultivate Initiatives and SnowCap.

Thank you to the many folks who regularly clear out their closets for a good cause. Some of these same people regularly donated bulk items such as feminine products, toothbrushes, and warmers/emergency blankets and granola bars.

Snow Cap Charities

SnowCap continues to be a favorite charity in this congregation:

In 2025, **a total of 764 lbs.** of pantry items/clothing goods were donated from PCUCC. (This includes Food Clothes, Hygiene Pet Food and other necessities.) *This is in addition to the Tackle Hunger -Super Bowl of Caring food drive! Well done, Us!!

Additionally, our annual **Tackle Hunger Soupler Bowl** of Caring-Canned food drive kicked off on Feb. 9. The Sunday School Class took "guesstimations" of how many pounds of food we collected.

Lea guessed closest to the correct poundage at 100 lbs. Parkrose UCC collected **102 lbs. of food and \$117.00** cold hard cash for SnowCap Charities!



Cultivate Initiatives

These amazing partners come every week and devotedly provide showers, laundry service, clothing & supplies for whoever is in need. These are some of my favorite people. We had a couple of new additions to our Wellness Wednesdays: **CareOregon**, Mental Health Counseling Support, Community Cycling Center and PBOT.

We did outreach most weeks on the surrounding neighborhood streets, which people in the area appreciate. The connectivity that happens when walking the neighborhood, and handing out water, granola bars, letting folks know that “we hope to see them for showers and lunch at the church by BiMart”.

Regardless of if people don't come for showers/laundry, they know there is a consistent “presence” of welcoming people at Parkrose UCC where folks can get a cup of coffee, a morning goodie, lunch, to charge their phones, do their dishes, get first aid and a blood pressure check with our **Nursing Students** from Sumner & Concordia Colleges, find a clean garment to wear, learn about resources, play the piano, get some pet food and enjoy social connections.



For the calendar year 2025, while we can't break it down to unique individuals per site (just one of our limitations with data at this moment), we do know that there were **2,041 interactions** at Parkrose UCC/WeShine site. That includes people who came just once, and folks who came back week after week

***That includes 508 showers given, 138 loads of laundry washed, and 730 distributions of hygiene supplies.** (In 2024, we had 356 showers

and had 744 points of contact. That is a dramatic increase. WOW!)

*The lunch count on Wednesdays is up +366 from last year-total lunches served for Wednesdays is 1,678!

PBOT-Portland Bureau of Transportation

We sadly had one of our unhoused neighbors die as a result of traffic collision. We invited PBOT to come and do a little outreach with high vis gear/reflective pins & bike lights. They submitted the following.

*“Since there are a lot of troubling events happening around the world and in our region, I wanted to share some uplifting news: PBOT Vision Zero’s preliminary data shows that we closed the calendar year 2025 with the **lowest traffic fatalities since 2018.**”*



Though one life is too many, the fact that we lost considerably fewer neighbors, friends and family members due in part to all the work we do together fills me with hope and appreciation to keep moving forward. Please stay tuned for the yearly crash report, and if you have not done so, sign up to the Vision Zero newsletter.

Fun fact, thanks to you, the Vision Zero team attended 124 events, activities, and presentations at community meetings in 2025 (we hosted a few of these events). I want to thank you for your collaboration and support as we strive to have fun activities and difficult conversations to meaningfully impact areas and communities most impacted by traffic violence.”

Christmas Eve and New Year’s Eve Fell on Wednesdays!

Thank you to Elizabeth, Lucille, Vickie, Cecilia, Jesse, Rita, Wende, Clay & Kevin (our Sexton) for helping to provide holiday experience for the people who need it the most. We served delicious hot meals and hot cocoa on both holidays 12/24 and 21 on 12/31/25.

An illustration of an instant community connection: A community member, who called themselves “a prepper,” donated many large cans of dehydrated food, canned soups, fruit, and vegetables. We shared these generous donations with our community through the new “Free Table,” friends at WeShine Village and SnowCap, and a group who cook meals for people living near the gorge and Sandy River Delta. On Christmas Eve, they visited, and we gave them dehydrated food, dog food, socks, scarves, and gloves. This group helps between 12 and 30 people regularly. We’re grateful for the community connections that grow and happen every day.



Portland Fruit Tree Project

We jazzed up our gardens by purchasing Native plants in partnership with Portland Fruit Tree Project, **Sparrowhawk** Native Plants.

Portland Fruit Tree Project hosted a **Spring break camp** at Parkrose UCC last spring. 20+ children were in attendance.

No doubt we drank **gallons of fresh-pressed cider** at the Annual Crafter’s bazaar & Fall Fest.

These opportunities could not be made without the assistance of this partnership. I look forward to additional opportunities that come our way via our delightful “fruit tree nerds.”

American Red Cross: We held one Blood Drive in May 2025. We had a goal of 15 units and we met that commitment! We look forward to adding a few blood drives on the calendar for 2026.

WeShine’s Parkrose Community Village continues to positively impact the Parkrose UCC community and creates a safe transitional village and enhanced stability and safety for guests, neighbors, and partners. WeShine Staff have assisted in sourcing bus tickets or the occasional odd need/requests.

We continue to collaborate for volunteer events, such as the queer arts support group and stay in communication about how we can support each other’s programs. Several of us cooked meals for Village council Dinners. The WeShine villagers always receive these meals enthusiastically.

This year we cooperatively presented a

documentary showing of **“No Place to Grow Old”** with **Humans for Housing** guest speakers and Q & A panel. A well-attended event, with Portland City Mayor Keith Wilson and spouse attending as well. We look forward to collaborating on these types of events in the future.



Hairstylists for Humanity Mykal stopped by on Christmas Eve and gave 7 haircuts to our community friends. His gift of dignity & skills is always in high demand. Mykal is moving to Argentina in the new year. He promises he will return periodically.

May our spirits remain generous and our hearts open and hopeful as we discover where 2026 takes us!

Parkrose Sack Lunch Program

The Sack Lunch Program was very successful in 2025. We made 2,591 lunches, and the cost was about \$1.18 per lunch. This was due to careful budgeting and with the generous donations of money and supplies for the lunches, which included paper supplies, water, cookies, bread, meat, cheese, and soup. We could not have been so successful without the help of volunteers and donations, as well as money budgeted by Parkrose Community UCC.

Many thanks to the wonderful volunteers including Donna Barker, Liz Morse, Blair Loudat, Jean Henry, Vickie Lyman, Diana Bower, Nancy Davis, John Colette, Barbara Walden, Cecilia Goodling, Erica Martin, Elizabeth Uribe, Barb McDermott, and Lucile Harden.



Lunches were served Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 12:30-1:30 pm. On Wellness Wednesdays, lunches were served in Eastminster Hall when Cultivate Initiatives provided showers and laundry services, the Nursing Program provided resources, haircuts were provided, and Care Oregon had a resource table. Spring and summer lunches included a sandwich, fruit, cookies, and water. Fall and winter lunches included soup, half sandwich, fruit, cookies, and water. People expressed how thankful they were that we provided the lunches.

2025 Investment Team Report

The Investment Team was established on February 14, 2010 by the Church Council. Investments with Scheller Financial Services and United Church Funds are currently being overseen by Blair Loudat. An Investment Policy was also created in 2010 by the original Investment Team and approved by the Church Council as a guide for investing. The Policy Statement reads:



“The stewardship responsibilities associated with the investment of Parkrose Community United Church of Christ investment funds are to be discharged in such a manner as to maximize the return on investments while also considering such factors as the preservation and safety of capital and prudent diversification of funds that are socially responsible.”

Our investments are currently held with Scheller Financial Services. They include the Endowment Fund and the Special Outreach Fund. The Endowment Fund is typically used for program enhancements or support. In 2025, Council voted to allocate \$5,000 to the Youth Collective. As a reminder, at the December 2023 Congregational Meeting, the restriction for congregational approval for use of the Endowment Fund was lifted allowing more flexibility for their use. The Special Outreach Fund currently supplements the church budget since expenditures exceed all other income coming in for the church.

The interest accrued each quarter from the Endowment Fund is sent to the church and becomes income in our budget. For 2025, the interest income was \$1,076. As of December 31, 2024, the fund had value of \$186,622. As of December 31, 2025, the value of the fund had increased to \$198,804 for an overall gain of **\$12,182** considering the \$5,000 withdrawal noted above.

Our Special Outreach Fund ended 2024 with a book value \$398,506 and ended 2025 with \$336,518 in our account. It is important to note that over the course of the year, \$100,000 was withdrawn for operating expenses resulting in a net loss for the year of **\$61,988** for this fund. The \$12,182 gain in the Endowment Fund leaves the overall loss in our investments at \$49,806. The total of our investment holdings is **\$535,412** as of December 31, 2025.

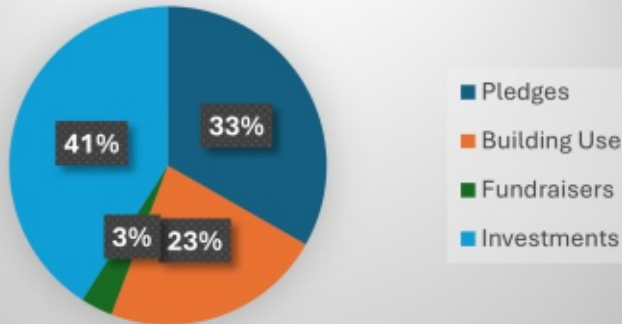
This year also included a move to a more cost-effective version of QuickBooks. We were able to hire a bookkeeper on a fee basis who assisted

with the transition to the new software though not without a few bumps along the way. The congregational meeting of the budget presentation in December revealed the need for more transparency in reporting our budget activity. Our goals for 2026 are addressing this issue and we are delighted to welcome two new members to the team in Julie Benois Sage and Bruce Altizer.

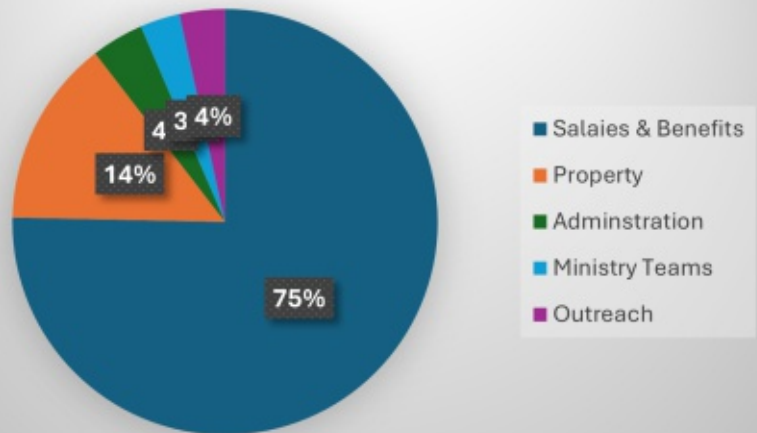
It was exciting to see that pledges exceeded the budgeted amount by \$17,812 and church plate was over budget by \$2,246. This meant that we only withdrew \$100,000 from the Special Outreach Fund instead of \$120,000 as we did in 2024. It was also a real boost to our income to have a successful auction and craft fair. The generosity of our members and friends is exceptional.

As we face many challenges in our community and the larger global community, Restorative Justice In Action's mission is to focus on the following:

- Educate ourselves about justice issues in our local and global community
- Connect with our local community regarding social justice issues
- Bring our congregation along on the journey

We supported the following justice related areas of need:

- Kalikasan Solidarity - attended events in the community to support human rights.
- Participated in caravans to the regional ICE detention facility in Tacoma, WA.
- WeShine - supporting WeShine's mission to partner with other faith communities to build additional villages.
- Created a text group so we can quickly (faster than email) provide real-time information regarding events and incidents happening locally. For instance, ICE activity and opportunities to immediately support our neighbors.

- Engaged with Together Lab including attending trainings and participating in organizing and activities.

Trustees Annual Report – 2025

- Mowed the church grass, trimmed weeds, and pruned shrubs during the 2025 growing season.
- Hauled pruned branches from fruit trees to a recycling center.
- Assisted with setting up and taking down equipment for the craft fair.
- Replaced the furnace filters.
- Replaced rotted boards in the wooden deck in the courtyard and repainted the entire deck with multiple coats.
- Set up and maintained the battery in the Ring doorbell camera at the office entrance.
- Travis installed a concrete-blocks crossing in the bioswale in the main parking lot. This allows people to cross from the outer parking lot to the church without getting their feet wet or having to walk around the bioswale.
- Worked with the Portland Fruit Tree staff to plant shrubs in the bioswale in the main parking lot.
- Scraped and painted the exterior vertical support beams and white trim in the front courtyard area.
- Scraped and repainted the southeast exterior wall of the church building in preparation for the mural installation.
- Installed the four-panel mural that was organized by Kate Greenblat on the southeast exterior wall of the church building.
- Travis and Jesse replaced the sink faucet in the small sink in the main kitchen. The new faucet is a big improvement for controlling water temperature.
- Installed emergency lights in the office hallway.
- Replaced a Wyze security camera in the office hallway that had stopped working. The new camera is a pivot model that changes direction to follow movement of people in the hallway.



- Replaced light bulbs and batteries in smoke detectors.
- Jesse worked with Tri-Phase Electric Supply to replace the fluorescent light bulbs on the outside of the church with more energy-efficient LED bulbs.
- Jesse has been working with Spencer Young at EIP Impact to obtain grants from Portland General Electric to install solar panels on the church roof with battery storage.
- Assisted with church Christmas decorations set up and take down.
- Set up microphones, display PowerPoint sides, and run the Facebook live stream for Sunday services in the sanctuary.
